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## **ABOUT THE WORLD SERIES OF POKER (WSOP)**

The World Series of Poker (WSOP) is the longest-running, largest, richest and most prestigious gaming event in the world, dating back 44 years to 1970, and having paid more than \$1.8 billion in total prize money to date. In 2014, the WSOP will feature 65 different poker events over 50 consecutive days.

At the 44<sup>th</sup> Annual WSOP, the event attracted a record 79,471 participants from 107 countries around the globe to the Rio All-Suite Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas – all competing for the game’s most coveted prize...a WSOP bracelet and a share of more than \$197 million in total prize money.

Featuring a comprehensive slate of tournaments in every major poker variation, the WSOP is poker’s longest running set of tournaments. The World Series of Poker culminates with the \$10,000 No-Limit Hold’em Championship, commonly referred to as the Main Event.

The winner of each event gets a World Series of Poker gold bracelet – recognized globally as the game’s highest honor – and a cash prize based on the number of entrants and the amount of the event buy-in. The prize pool for the past seven years (\$1.3 billion) is nearly triple the total prize pool of the first 37 years of the WSOP combined (\$530 million).

Buy-ins for the different events range from \$500 to \$1,000,000 depending on the event and, unlike other sporting events, anyone 21 years of age or older can enter, and anyone can win. Winning a WSOP tournament is a life-changing event, making instant stars and often instant millionaires out of those with a dream and the determination to outmaneuver and outlast the competition.

Caesars Entertainment acquired the WSOP in 2004, and participation in the event has grown exponentially under its tenure.

## **BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WORLD SERIES OF POKER**

Though the World Series of Poker made its official debut in 1970, the idea of the Horseshoe Casino's annual tournament was actually conceived more than two decades earlier.

In the summer of 1949, as the story goes, inveterate gambler Nicholas “Nick the Greek” Dandolos approached Benny Binion with an unusual request – to challenge the best in a high-stakes poker marathon. Binion agreed to set up a match between Dandolos and the legendary Johnny Moss, with the stipulation the game be viewed in public.

During the course of the marathon, which lasted five months with breaks only for sleep, the two men played every form of poker imaginable. Moss ultimately won “the biggest game in town” and an estimated \$2 million. When the Greek lost his last pot, he arose from his chair, bowed slightly, and uttered the now-famous words, “Mr. Moss, I have to let you go.” Dandolos then went upstairs to bed.

Though significant in its own way as a chapter in poker history, the five-month marathon took on added importance to Benny Binion. He noted that the public had gathered outside the casino each day to watch the game with the fervor of dedicated sports fans, and he was amazed at the attention the event had attracted. But it wasn't until 1970 that Binion decided to re-create this excitement and stage a battle of poker giants – dubbed the “World Series of Poker” – to determine who would be worthy of the title World Champion. Some of the best players in the country were assembled, and Johnny Moss came out on top. The decision was democratic in that the champion was decided by popular vote.

The following year, the winner was determined by a freeze-out competition, with players being systematically eliminated until one player had all the chips. Moss again became the World Champion. In 1972, when Thomas “Amarillo Slim” Preston won the title and went on the talk-show circuit, the WSOP began to gain a wider following.

It was a year later that Binion participated in the Oral History Project at the University of Nevada-Reno and discussed the World Series of Poker (WSOP) with interviewer Mary Ellen Glass. “This poker game here gets us a lot of attention,” he told Glass. “We had seven players last year, and this year we had 13. I look to have better than 20 next year. It's even liable to get up to be 50, might get up to be more than that.” Binion then paused, and as if gazing into the future, prophesied, “It will eventually.”

In the early 1980s, with the introduction of preliminary satellite competitions with lower buy-ins, Binion's prophecy came to fruition and the popularity of the World Series of Poker soared. (A satellite is a tournament whose prize is an entry into another higher buy-in tournament).

But even Benny Binion, who passed away on Christmas Day of 1989, would have had difficulty foreseeing the enormous growth the annual tournament has experienced since.

In 1982, nine years after Mr. Binion participated in UNR's Oral History Project, the tournament drew a total of 1,253 entrants across all its events. Two decades later, there were 7,593 entries and 2013's WSOP attracted a record 79,471 entrants from an astonishing 107 different nations. The prize money has increased exponentially as well. In 1982, a total of \$2,607,700 was awarded, while in 2012 a staggering \$222,035,192 was won. Whereas only 12 events, mostly Texas Hold'em and Seven-Card Stud, were scheduled as recently as 1988, the 2013 tournament offered 62 competitions that feature a wide variety of games.

The WSOP is now a global phenomenon, with WSOP Europe and WSOP Asia-Pacific also staples on the event calendar.

Today, the legacy Benny Binion left the poker community ranks as the oldest, largest, most prestigious, and most media-hyped gaming competition in the world, and, no doubt, it holds the promise of an even brighter future. But equally important, the World Series of Poker has touched thousands of lives over the years, affording talented players the opportunity to follow their dreams, reach for the stars and perhaps one day achieve greatness in their chosen endeavor.

## **REMINISCING: 10 YEARS OF MEMORIES OF THE WSOP AT THE RIO**

From the first open bracelet awarded to Allen Cunningham in 2005 to the river card of Ryan Riess's Main Event victory this past fall, the Rio All-Suite Hotel and Casino has played host to a number of memorable moments over the past decade. It would be impossible to reminisce about all of the noteworthy moments, but here are highlights from a decade at the Rio:

### **2005**

The Rio's maiden voyage as the host of the World Series of Poker was filled with a number of big name bracelet wins. The open event action kicked off with Allen Cunningham winning the first bracelet awarded outside of Binion's, then continued with wins for Phil Ivey and Academy Award nominee Jennifer Tilly. Johnny Chan made history with his record 10<sup>th</sup> bracelet in Event 24, only to have Doyle Brunson tie for ten just a few days later by winning Event 31. The series ended with a bang, as the Main Event attendance exploded, doubling in size from 2004 with 5,619 entries. Even with the massive increase in competition, reigning champ Greg Raymer put together an impressive run, taking 25<sup>th</sup> place, while the \$7.5 million championship payday went to Australia's first Main Event Champion, Joe Hachem.

### **2006**

The 2006 series almost started the way 2005 ended, as Joe Hachem came close to winning a bracelet in the fifth event of the summer. Dutch Boyd denied Hachem a second piece of hardware, but this would be a year for redemption for past Main Event runner-ups Sammy Farha and David Williams, who both won events. Phil Hellmuth also found his way to the winner's circle, joining the elite group of 10-time winners. A then 21-year-old Jeff Madsen collected not one, but two bracelets at three final tables, not only temporarily claiming the title of youngest bracelet winner, but also earning Player of the Year honors. While the young gun wowed poker fans, a revered member of poker's old guard won the first-ever \$50,000 H.O.R.S.E. event. After a marathon heads-up battle, the late Chip Reese defeated Andy Bloch to win the trophy that would later bear his name. As for the Main Event, it was the largest in WSOP history with an astonishing 8,773 entries. Jamie Gold bested the record field to earn the record payday of \$12 million in one of the most memorable Main Event runs in recent memory.

### **2007**

The opening event of the 2007 WSOP reminded us just how many young guns were flocking to the game, as Steve Bilirakis won his first bracelet at the young age of 21 years, 10 days. While there were plenty of young online whiz kids taking home bracelets, the big names managed to rack up big wins as well. For the third year in a row, Allen Cunningham came to the Rio and left with a bracelet. Meanwhile, Phil Hellmuth moved into a league of his own with a record-setting 11<sup>th</sup> bracelet win. Player of the Year honors went to Tom Schneider, who won two bracelets over the course of the summer to take the title. The summer ended with a 6,358-player Main Event and an internationally diverse final table that saw amateur Jerry Yang prevail to take the bracelet and the \$8.25 million payday.

### **2008**

The 2008 World Series made news before it even began with the announcement of the new "November Nine" concept, which delayed the Main Event final table three months in order for it to play out live on television. The change resulted in a climactic Main Event finale that turned nine relative unknowns who played their way through a field of 6,844 into poker superstars. While it was truck driver Dennis Phillips who finished the summer with the chip lead, it would be 22-year-old Peter Eastgate who would win the tournament, dethroning Phil Hellmuth as the youngest Main Event champion ever. The Main Event wasn't the only highlight of 2008 though. Scotty Nguyen made history by winning the \$50,000 H.O.R.S.E. event and remains the only player to have won both the \$50K and the Main Event. The brothers Hinkle, Grant and Blair, were the toast of the series as they both won bracelets, but the real star of 2008 was Erick Lindgren, who went from the list of "best players without a bracelet" to both a bracelet winner and Player of the Year thanks to a stellar performance that resulted in a win and two final table appearances, including third place in the \$50,000 H.O.R.S.E. event.

## **2009**

The 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the WSOP was the year it seemed like we were seeing double as Brock Parker, Phil Ivey, and Greg Mueller all managed to win two bracelets. The eventual Player of the Year, Jeff Lisandro, one-upped them all though, winning three bracelets in one summer. Ivey may not have won a third, but he did make headlines by final tabling the Main Event along with the logger from Maryland, Darvin Moon. The pro headlined the November Nine, but it was a youngster by the name of Joe Cada who took the title. The 21-year-old from Michigan defeated a field of 6,494 to win over \$8.5 million and set the record for youngest champ in Main Event history—an honor he still holds five years later.

## **2010**

The summer of 2010 started and ended with the same guy—Michael “The Grinder” Mizrachi. The Florida-based poker pro kicked off the summer with a win in the \$50,000 Poker Players Championship, which shifted the format for the event from H.O.R.S.E. to an eight-game rotation. Mizrachi was the first of several longtime players to win a bracelet that summer, including Chris Bell, Gavin Smith, Matt Matros, and Eric Buchman. The lone two-time winner of the year was Frank Kassela, who edged out Mizrachi for Player of Year honors. The Grinder’s performance was nonetheless impressive though, as he final tabled the Main Event, eventually taking fifth, while Jonathan Duhamel went on to win Canada’s first World Championship along with \$8.9 million, besting a field of 7,319 players.

## **2011**

The WSOP is typically about winners, but sometimes it is a player’s inability to win that makes the headlines. Such was the case in 2011, as Phil Hellmuth had three opportunities to up his bracelet tally from 11, only to come up short all three times, including in the \$50,000 Poker Players championship, where Brian Rast bested the Poker Brat to win his second bracelet of the summer. Rast won two bracelets, but it was Ben Lamb who claimed Player of the Year honors. Lamb played less than ten events that summer, but seemed to hold the chip lead in all of them, including the Main Event, where he eventually finished in third place, while Germany’s Pius Heinz took the bracelet, besting a field of 6,865 players to win \$8.7 million.

## **2012**

Picking up one seven-figure score in a single summer at the WSOP puts you in elite company. Doing it twice makes you Player of the Year. Just ask Greg Merson, who dominated 2012 with a seven-figure bracelet win in the \$10,000 Six-Handed event, then snatched POY honors from Phil Hellmuth by following it up with a Main Event victory. Hellmuth had his moment in the spotlight though, winning his 12<sup>th</sup> bracelet (and first in an event besides No Limit Hold’em), battling heads-up in one room while Phil Ivey and Andy Frankenberger battled heads-up in another. Hellmuth prevailed, then won bracelet 13 over in Europe, while Ivey came up short of another bracelet. Adding to the repeat feats was Michael Mizrachi, who became the first-ever two-time \$50,000 Poker Players Champion. Merson and Hellmuth weren’t the only Player of the Year contenders that year either. Antonio Esfandiari made history by winning the first-ever \$1 million buy-in Big One for One Drop event for over \$18 million, then picked up a second bracelet at WSOP Europe to make this the most hotly contested POY race in WSOP history.

## **2013**

Last year, the WSOP was making millionaires left and right. The introduction of the Millionaire Maker was a smashing success, as was the start of the \$111,111 One Drop High Rollers event. While there were plenty of players returning to the winners circle, with 12 previous bracelet winners earning another bracelet, there were plenty of new winners, including several from the WSOP Circuit like Loni Harwood, who was also one of two women to win a bracelet in open events. The biggest Circuit winner of all though, was our reigning WSOP Main Event Champ though. Just a year after cashing in his first Circuit event, Ryan Riess triumphed over a field of 6,352 players to capture \$8,361,570, the bracelet, and ended the World Series of Poker with a memorable bang in front of the ESPN cameras.

## ATHLETES WHO HAVE PLAYED IN THE WORLD SERIES OF POKER

National Hockey League (NHL) goaltender Roberto Luongo made WSOP history in 2012, when he became just the second pro athlete to cash in the WSOP Main Event in its 44-year history.

Luongo finished in 634<sup>th</sup> place, taking home \$19,227 for his efforts. He was quoted as saying, “I don’t care what anybody says, never mind the playoffs, this is stress” when talking about the rigors of the WSOP Main Event. That from a guy who has been part of an Olympics Gold Medal-winning team and a four-time NHL All-Star goaltender playing one of the most stressful positions in all of sports.

Luongo also told an interviewer that poker is popular amongst athletes, for its very competitive nature. On plane rides and during down time on the road, many athletes enjoy the game of poker.

The WSOP, with its broad appeal, has long seen athletes participate. Here are some of those that have appeared in the WSOP over the years.


## NATIONS PARTICIPATING IN WORLD SERIES OF POKER

## **BRACELETS AWARDED BY YEAR**


We take the scarcity of the bracelet very seriously. Some numbers to help put things in perspective. In 2013, with 62 events at the WSOP, the average number of players per event was 1,282, the second highest average ever. Thus to win a WSOP gold bracelet, one would have to defeat 1,281 players on average. Going back just one decade, you will see the average entrants per event were 210 for 36 events at the 2003 WSOP. In 1982, it was 89 entrants average for 17 events. The demand has never been greater, thus the supply increases to meet it. So, despite the number of bracelets up for grabs, the fact is, it has never been harder to win one.

## WSOP.com LIVE STREAMING PLANS – 2014 WSOP

### RFID TECHNOLOGY AND HOLE CARDS RETURN

During the 2014 World Series of Poker, WSOP.com, the official website of the World Series of Poker will live web stream final tables of official gold bracelet events – free to viewers.

The stream will be seen exclusively on WSOP.com.

Two final tables a day could be streamed, with scheduled start times of 1 pm PT and 2 pm PT, assuming they have reached the final table by that time. That said, with 30 and 5-minute delays being employed, final tables may be viewed beginning at 1:05, 1:30, 2:05 or 2:30 depending on day/event, etc.

All live streaming will begin when the official final table gets underway, thus hard start times are difficult to predict but announcements will be made via the WSOP's official Twitter feed at [www.twitter.com/WSOP](http://www.twitter.com/WSOP)

All WSOP live streaming will be found here: [www.wsop.com/2014/live-video/](http://www.wsop.com/2014/live-video/)

Two distinct streams will be available.

The *primary stream* will feature six different cameras along with announcer/analyst audio and card graphics – including hole card information. This means, all WSOP streams with hole card graphics will stream on a *30-minute delay*. These webcasts will feature Hold'em and Omaha Hi games in most instances and be streamed from the main WSOP TV set inside the Amazon Ballroom at the Rio. Poker Productions, known for their terrific TV work, will oversee the production of these events.

The card information will be known to the viewers by using RFID (radio-frequency identification) technology. Each card has a microchip embedded in it that has no impact on the cards or play, but with a specially-outfitted poker table, can send an encrypted signal to decipher the card's rank and suit. (The WSOP used this technology during the 2013 WSOP and previously with success).

Renowned play-by-play anchor **David Tuchman** will serve as the WSOP's official announcer for the primary webcasts and will be joined by a rotating group of player analysts.

We anticipate the primary stream to feature 32 WSOP gold bracelet events over 40 days of coverage, beginning with Event #1 on Wednesday, May 28 and continuing through Sunday, July 6 when the Little One for ONE DROP is expected to conclude the coverage.

When two final tables are taking place on the same day, WSOP.com will employ a four-camera, announcer-free stream for the secondary stream. These streams will feature the audio from the tournament director's microphone. Most non-flop games will be featured in these webcasts. All of these WSOP.com live final table web streams will be with a five-minute delay and without hole cards. These will appear exclusively on WSOP.com.

On the days that three final tables are taking place, the WSOP will effort to bring one final table on a live streaming set when one of the other two event ends, but there are likely scenarios where some final tables will receive no live streaming.

Key notes: All the "live" coverage on WSOP.com is on either a 30-minute or a 5-minute delay.  
When the delay is 30 minutes, hole cards will be shown.  
When the delay is 5-minutes, the coverage will be sans hole cards. (Community & "all-in" cards will be shown).  
Start times are estimates. Events stream when official final table is reached.  
David Tuchman and player analyst audio will be heard live to the audience, but video they are commenting on is on 30-minute delay to them. Thus no announcers/camera people will know hole card information either.  
Specific events to be streamed are subject to change without notice. We can't guarantee which events will get primary stream coverage, but do reserve the right to switch which events will be shown with hole cards on 30-minute delay.

*Jason of Beverly Hills* returns as the official bracelet designer and manufacturer for 2014.

The timing of the ceremony is to coincide with the return of players from the first break of the noon tournament. With a Brasilia Room full of players, the previous day's event winner(s) will be welcomed to the stage, where each will be awarded a gold bracelet and pose for photos as the national anthem of the winner's choosing is played.

In addition, each new bracelet holder will receive a new Total Rewards card. As is custom for WSOP winners, Caesars Entertainment awards "Diamond" status – an exclusive club reserved for Caesars' best customers – to all bracelet holders for one year.

Play in the Brasilia Room will be halted during the ceremony and commence following the brief ceremony.

It should be noted that the time of this ceremony will differ some days based on scheduled start days at 11 am or 10 am on this year's schedule. Additionally, some days will have no ceremonies, when no final tables are contested on the previous day's schedule.

## WSOP SENIORS EVENT - \$1,000 Buy-In (3-Day Event)

### Friday, June 6<sup>th</sup> at 10 AM – Seniors No Limit Hold'em Championship

The World Series of Poker first offered a seniors-only event in 2001. And every year since, the WSOP has been proud to offer an event for those ages 50 and older and offer a prestigious gold bracelet to the winner.

At the 45<sup>th</sup> annual WSOP, the Seniors-only event is slated for **Friday, June 6<sup>th</sup> at 10 a.m.** as Event #17.


The event has always been a \$1,000 buy-in No Limit Hold'em tournament and remains so in 2014.

This event has grown for nine consecutive years, by a significant amount too.

The record was set last year when a staggering 4,407 people entered – the most ever for a poker event at one time, creating an incredible \$3,966,300 prize pool. Ken Lind of Layton, Utah came out on top, winning \$634,890 for his efforts. Attendance grew by nearly 7% in 2013, after growing by nearly 10% in 2012, 20% in 2011, 16% in 2010 and 22% in 2009.

***Thursday, June 19, 2014 – 4:00 p.m. – Event #41***

### **New Event for WSOP in 2014**

Continuing with a World Series of Poker tradition of adding new wrinkles to the schedule, Event #41 this year is a new addition to the schedule.

Most people learned the game of poker sitting around a kitchen table, playing what ultimately turned into Dealer's Choice, where the person shuffling and dealing the cards, chose the game to be played.

Drafted off that concept, the WSOP is offering a selection of 16 different variants of poker all inside one event. WSOP poker dealers will deal players – with the game selection determined by the player who has the special Dealer's Choice Button. Each game will be played for one orbit, when the next player in line chooses which game to deal when the orbit completes. The entire event will play out this way, up and including through a winner being crowned.

WSOP Event #41 is on **Thursday, June 19 at 4:00 p.m.**, offering a three-day event with a \$1,500 buy-in.

It is expected to require a lot of strategy to navigate this event, but with a modest \$1,500 price point, it is also an event players can feel comfortable participating in and even learning a few games on the fly.

Among the games to choose from are:

## **\$50,000 POKER PLAYERS CHAMPIONSHIP – 8-GAME MIX**

*Sunday, June 22, 2014 – 4 PM PT – Event #46*

The \$50,000 Poker Players Championship requires participants to play a rotation of eight popular forms of poker – Limit Hold'em, Omaha Hi-Low Split-8 or Better, Seven Card Razz, Seven Card Stud, Seven Card Stud Hi-Low Split 8 or Better, No Limit Hold'em, Pot Limit Omaha and 2-7 Triple Draw Lowball – to determine the game's greatest all-around player.

The game rotates every eight hands and all levels are 90 minutes. The tournament takes five days to complete. Players begin with 150,000 in tournament chips.

Poker greats consider the winner of the event the best all-around player because it demonstrates he or she can outplay the competition in a wide range of game variations with high stakes on the line.

The WSOP first added the \$50,000 event to its schedule in 2006 in response to player requests to participate in a high entry fee game to determine the professional poker player's true champion.

The event was an instant highlight and is now a mainstay at the World Series of Poker. This year it begins on Sunday, June 22 at 4 p.m. and is Event #46 on the schedule.

A special commemorative "Chip Reese Trophy" is awarded and named in honor of the inaugural winner of this event, David "Chip" Reese, who passed away in late 2007. The iconic trophy was first added for the event's champion in 2008, with the winner keeping the top part of the trophy for the year, while his name is engraved on the bottom half, etched forever in history.

The \$50,000 buy-in fee is the second-most expensive of the 65 events at the 2014 World Series of Poker.

## WSOP LADIES EVENT

### Friday, June 27<sup>th</sup> at 12 noon – Ladies No Limit Hold'em Championship

The World Series of Poker first offered a women's-only event in 1977. And every year since, the WSOP has been proud to offer an event for the ladies and with a prestigious gold bracelet on the line.

At the 45<sup>th</sup> annual WSOP this year, the ladies-only event is slated for **Friday, June 27<sup>th</sup> at 12 noon**. Since 2005, the event had been a \$1,000 buy-in No Limit Hold'em tournament.

Last year, the buy-in was changed to \$10,000, marking the sixth different price change in this event's history. Ladies this year will continue to receive a 90% discount and pay \$1,000 to enter this event.

This event originally started out as a Seven Card Stud tournament with a buy-in of \$100.

While the game of choice offered was Seven Card Stud from 1977 through 1999, the buy-in had only been at \$1,000 since 1992. From 1982 through 1991, the ladies event had a \$500 buy-in. From 1979-1981 it was \$400 and in 1978 the buy-in was \$200.

In 2000, the game variation changed for the first time in the event's history, offering a 1/2 Limit Hold'em, 1/2 Seven Card Stud event. This event format stayed constant through 2003.

In 2004, the Ladies Event was just a Limit Hold'em tournament. In 2005, it switched to No Limit Hold'em, which has remained the same since.

## **\$1,000,000 BIG ONE FOR ONE DROP NO LIMIT HOLD'EM**

**Sunday, June 29 at 1:11 PM – Event #57**

**Televised on ESPN July 29, August 5 & August 12**

It has been called insane, audacious and incomprehensible. But one thing is for sure, this event captured the attention of the poker when it debuted in 2012. And it is back this year.

*The Big One for One Drop* is a made-for-television charity poker tournament that may award the largest first place prize ever (\$20,000,000) and feature the most unique collection of millionaires (and billionaires) ever assembled together.

The largest buy-in poker tournament ever conceived, with a \$1,000,000 entry fee, is slated to take place from June 29 – July 1, 2014 at the Rio All-Suite Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas and will be televised on ESPN over three consecutive Tuesdays on July 29, August 5 and August 12.

From each entry fee, \$111,111 will be donated to ONE DROP, with a goal of raising enough money for a legacy project that will help a country with access to clean water. The event will be rake-free allowing \$888,889 of each entry fee going directly into the prize pool. Players will start with 3,000,000 in tournament chips and blinds at 3,000-6,000 with a 1,000 ante. The tournament, to be played as No-Limit Hold'em, is expected to pay out 16-20% of the field and a specially-designed WSOP platinum bracelet will be awarded to the victor.

Subject to the rules of the tournament, anyone age 21 or older is eligible as long as they have the \$1 million entry fee. The field will be capped at 56 players.

The BIG ONE for ONE DROP is the creation of ONE DROP Chair and *Cirque du Soleil*® Founder Guy Laliberté in collaboration with fellow Montrealer and Caesars Interactive Entertainment CEO Mitch Garber. The inaugural event sold out with 48 entries, created a more than \$42 million prize pool, and awarded winner Antonio Esfandiari a staggering \$18,346,673 first place prize.

But more importantly, the event generated more than \$10 million for charities, including \$5.6 million directly to One Drop. Making use of WSOP's poker expertise and global reach, the event is an unprecedented effort to raise awareness of water-related issues amongst the poker community and to raise funds to allow ONE DROP to continue to deliver on its important mandate. Funds will be directed to ONE DROP projects around the world, where the team is hard at work dealing with the local water crisis.

The event begins on Sunday, June 29 at 1:11 pm, with the final table to be contested on Tuesday, July 1 at 1:00 pm.

ESPN cameras will be on hand to film the action, with special emphasis on the final two days of play. The finished television show will air over three consecutive weeks in two-hour blocks as part of ESPN's coverage of the WSOP in 2014.

The World Series of Poker has a long and successful track record of using its platform each summer to help galvanize the generosity of the poker community to support worthwhile causes by using poker tournaments as the fun and friendly mechanism.

## MAIN EVENT – FINAL TABLE

**NOVEMBER 10-11, 2014**

**Televised on Live; Monday, Nov. 10 on ESPN2 & Tuesday, Nov. 11 on ESPN**

In 2008, the World Series of Poker announced a groundbreaking change to the conclusion of the world’s most prestigious poker event – the \$10,000 buy-in No Limit Hold’em World Championship, commonly referred to as the Main Event.

In 2014, for the seventh consecutive year, the plan continues with the revised format of poker’s most seminal competition, aligning the tournament and the television experience.

The Main Event in 2014 will be contested from July 5-14, and then play will stop until Monday, November 10, resuming on that date with the final nine players live on ESPN2. The winner will be crowned on Tuesday, November 11 in front of a live television audience on ESPN.

Each of the nine players who make it to the WSOP Main Event Final Table will receive ninth-place prize money on July 15, when the finalists are determined. The WSOP will then provide each of those players with an expenses-paid trip for two for their return to Las Vegas in November to play the final portion of the tournament.

From July 15 to November 10, a span of 119 days, players will have an opportunity to arrange for all their friends and family to come witness in-person, the dramatic conclusion of the tournament. In addition, they will be able to line up sponsorships and coaches, review the play of all their competitors, participate in other tournaments and take advantage of the new publicity and promotional opportunities available to them.

The change in how the Main Event final table is staged brings the excitement and drama of high-stakes WSOP tournament play closer to millions of fans around the globe and creates an incredible atmosphere inside the Penn & Teller Theater that is more akin to a major stadium spectator sport than traditional poker events.

The winner of the Main Event is expected to be crowned early on the morning on November 12.



## WORLD SERIES OF POKER PLAYER OF THE YEAR POWERED BY BLUFF.COM

The World Series of Poker (WSOP) instituted a Player of the Year system in 2004, after Caesars Entertainment acquired the brand.

The system awards points based on finish for all open bracelet events. Anyone who cashes in an open WSOP gold bracelet event is awarded points. The player with the most overall points is the winner of the WSOP Player of the Year. Bluff Media created and powers the formula used to determine the WSOP POY.

Adding the WSOP Player of the Year to your resume is one of the highest honors a poker player can achieve.

Typically, the individual who wins this award has multiple in-the-money finishes and a WSOP gold bracelet among those cashes. In fact, no player has won the award without at least capturing a gold bracelet.

The WSOP Player of the Year includes all open bracelet events in a calendar year. The 2013 winner, Daniel Negreanu, had 71 events to compete in to qualify for the WSOP Player of the Year.

In 2014, with the ten WSOP gold bracelets being awarded in October at WSOP Asia-Pacific in Melbourne, Australia, a total of 72 open bracelet events will determine the 2014 WSOP Player of the Year. 62 open events at WSOP will kick it off, with WSOP Asia-Pacific and the WSOP Main Event final table in November likely to ultimately determine our winner.

Daniel Negreanu became the first player in WSOP history to capture the WSOP Player of the Year title twice and did it by virtue of strong showings at all three WSOP events – WSOP Europe, WSOP in Las Vegas and WSOP Asia-Pacific.

Stewart overhauled the WSOP Circuit events, complete with year-long rankings, a \$1,000,000 bracelet event and television coverage. Stewart continues to evolve and expand WSOP branded events globally, overseeing venue changes and the launch of WSOP Asia-Pacific in 2013. He is central to all licensing agreements including products launched by Microsoft and Electronic Arts adorned with the WSOP brand.

Since joining Caesars, Stewart has shown the ability to land mainstream corporate partners traditionally elusive to the gaming industry.. During his tenure, Stewart has secured promotion for the WSOP on products ranging from Beef Jerky to Beer Cans and Chocolate Bars. Just this past fall, Frito Lay's iconic Ruffles brands executed a mass national promotion on more than 30 million bags of Potato Chips.

Stewart is perhaps best known at the WSOP for creating the modern concept for the Main Event Final Table, known to poker fans as the *November Nine*.

Stewart manages the ESPN partnership and is responsible for continued expansion of WSOP Original Programming, including the "Every-hand" coverage of the WSOP Main Event Final Table since 2012, along with annual coverage of WSOP National Championship, WSOP Europe, and WSOP APAC.

In 2013, Bluff Magazine ranked Stewart as the fifth-most influential person in poker in their annual "Power 20" marking the fourth consecutive year Stewart has been in the top 10 of the list. The Las Vegas Business Press has also honored Stewart as one of the 10 "Rising Stars of Business."

Stewart is also a senior executive for the WSOP's parent company, Caesars Interactive Entertainment (CIE) where he works closely with the team's foray into online gaming in Nevada and New Jersey.

Stewart claims his biggest accomplishment in poker was Event #1 of the 2012 WSOP, where he cashed in 19<sup>th</sup> place of 732 entrants in the Casino Employees event. He also proudly claims to have oversold "pieces" of himself to fellow WSOP staffers and thereby owing more than he cashed in the event. .

Prior to joining Caesars, Stewart held a variety of ascending positions over seven years at the National Football League's headquarters in New York City. Effel is responsible for staffing, rule enforcement, event structure development and payout percentages, plus overseeing all tournament operations. He is a full-time employee of the Rio, working on WSOP events year-round and overseeing the development and execution of international poker operations. He manages all Caesars Las Vegas properties' tournament poker operations, as well as any special poker events held at Las Vegas Caesars properties. In addition, Effel provides poker support to all properties within the Caesars enterprise, including overseeing the WSOP Circuit tour events.

Possessing an impressive background in all facets of poker operations, Effel was in the thick of things as the boom in poker exploded over the last decade. He has created innovative solutions to manage tournaments in a manner that benefits both players and the host properties. From integrating sophisticated software to manage registration and payouts or crunching numbers to produce an algorithm resulting in balanced payouts, Effel is involved in all phases of poker, relying on a bevy of real life experiences to ensure the right measures are taken to keep the World Series of Poker in its industry-leading position.

In 2005, Effel joined the World Series of Poker staff as the assistant tournament director, just months after serving in the same capacity at several WSOP Circuit Events earlier that year. Effel returned in 2006 to serve as the WSOP's co-tournament director and he has served as the sole tournament director since 2007.

Additionally, Effel has served as the tournament director of the World Series of Poker Europe since its inception in 2007 and added WSOP Asia-Pacific oversight in 2013. Effel's tournament involvement began in 2000 with the World Poker Open and he became a full-time tournament director in 2004.

It's safe to say poker has always been in Jack's blood. His father used to organize poker games in the 1930's and 40's while serving in the army, for his fellow troops. Effel has a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from the University of Mississippi and a Masters of Hospitality Administration from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

## ABOUT WORLD SERIES OF POKER EUROPE

The World Series of Poker Europe (WSOPE) was established in 2007 by Caesars Interactive Entertainment to bring the excitement and entertainment of the World Series of Poker to destinations around the globe.

WSOPE was the first live tournament brand extension internationally of the world's longest-running, richest and most prestigious gaming event. During the first seven years of the WSOPE, a total of 10,726 entrants have competed for 38 gold bracelets and been awarded \$72,306,303 in prize money.

In the first four years, the event was held in London, England at the Casino at the Empire in Leicester Square. For the next two years, the WSOPE was held in Cannes, France at the Casino Barrière de Cannes Croisette and the Hotel Majestic Barrière. In 2013, the event took place in Paris, France at Enghien Les Biens and Casino Barrière.

With the advent of WSOP Asia-Pacific, the new format calls for one international event each year, so WSOP Europe moves to an odd-year schedule and will return in 2015 as WSOP APAC takes place Oct. 2-18, 2014 in Melbourne, Australia.

## POKER HALL OF FAME

The Poker Hall of Fame, established in 1979, was acquired by Caesars Entertainment along with the World Series of Poker in 2004. Though the Hall of Fame is virtual in nature, its membership includes poker's most influential players and other important contributors to the game.

There are 21 living members, and the honor of Poker Hall-of-Famer has been bestowed upon 46 individuals.

The Poker Hall of Fame traditionally elects one or two members annually. The enshrinement ceremony is now held in concert with the final table of the Main Event of the WSOP, held each November in Las Vegas. The main criteria for the Poker Hall of Fame are as follows:

- A player must have played poker against acknowledged top competition
- Be a minimum of 40 years old at time of nomination
- Played for high stakes
- Played consistently well, gaining the respect of peers
- Stood the test of time
- Or, for non-players, contributed to the overall growth and success of the game of poker, with indelible positive and lasting results.

## **POKER HALL OF FAME VOTING GUIDELINES**

As in the previous four years, the nomination, selection and voting process will culminate in the enshrinement of a worthy inductee(s) as part of the WSOP Main Event Final Table.

The process will work as follows:

- The public will be able to submit a name(s) for consideration via online submissions at [www.WSOP.com](http://www.WSOP.com).
- On or after August 15, the entire list of submitted individuals will be forwarded to the Nominating Committee, who will be tasked with reviewing all submissions and determining the final list of eligible candidates for 2014 induction. The committee will determine if any others should be added (such as non-poker players who have contributed greatly to the game, any glaring omissions, etc.) and determine the final eligible list.
- The Nominating Committee's final list will be announced in September. Anyone on this list will be forwarded to the official voters, made up of current Poker Hall of Fame members and select media, who will cast ballots to determine the induction class in 2014.
- A finalist ballot will be sent to the current Hall-of-Famers (21 living) who will each rank the nominees in order of preference – ranking only those they deem worthy of admission in 2014. Each Hall-of-Famer will also have the ability to add a write-in candidate, who won't be eligible for admission in 2014, but will automatically be added to the consideration list for 2015. In addition, a select group of media members will also be sent a ballot for ranking the finalists. All votes will be cast in private, with each PHOF and media member entitled but not obligated to keep their vote secret. After receiving back all ballots, the PHOF governing council reviews the selections and helps finalize any tiebreakers or errors.
- The two finalists receiving the most votes, as long as they are a majority, will be inducted during the enshrinement ceremony at the Final Table of Main Event in November, 2014.

## **THE WORLD SERIES OF POKER GOLD BRACELET: POKER'S ULTIMATE ACHIEVEMENT**

***Prestige: respect or reputation derived from achievements, power, associations, etc.***

-- Oxford Dictionary

There's nothing quite like it -- anywhere.

Comparisons can be made to a championship title belt in boxing, or the green jacket in golf, or the gold medal in the Olympic Games. But nothing quite compares to the one-inch by eight-inch cylinder of dazzling gold that symbolizes poker's ultimate achievement.

Indeed, the *World Series of Poker Gold Bracelet* stands apart from all other amulets of excellence for what it represents -- not just for a few world-class sports stars fortunate enough to possess great athleticism as is the case with title belts and trophies -- but rather to millions of ordinary, everyday people from all walks of life, both male and female, from more than a hundred nations around the world. The gold bracelet is a prize that can feasibly be won and ultimately worn by *anyone* driven by a dream.

Although the Gold Bracelet is accessible to millions of would-be poker champions, this is not to say winning one is easy. To the contrary, the path to a bona fide WSOP title often begins in a basement, across a kitchen table, or inside a college dorm room. This is usually where poker players and the most outlandish of aspirations are born.

For a fortunate few, the seeds of those aspirations flower into a WSOP Gold Bracelet, the game's greatest honor.

The WSOP began in 1970, making it the oldest and most prestigious poker competition on the planet. The annual poker festival was initially held at Binion's Horseshoe in Downtown Las Vegas, which played host to the eclectic gathering of poker aficionados and gamblers during the first 35 years. During the tournament's earliest years, winners received a trophy or a silver plate, but those accolades didn't seem appropriate for poker's motley moors and prideful traditions. Winning a WSOP championship had to be celebrated with something flashier. The keepsake had to be an ostentatious expression of personal triumph that represented overcoming the odds and defeating the world's very best.

And so, the WSOP Gold Bracelet was born.

In 1976, WSOP founder and patriarch Benny Binion decided to award Gold Bracelets for the first time. It proved to be a brilliant move. After all, other than the prominent poker face, the most visible part of a player's body while sitting at the table and competing is *the hands*. Wrists with Gold Bracelets were winners. Wrists without were losers, or at least victory hadn't come yet. The Gold Bracelet was -- and very much remains -- not just a fashion statement, but poker's ultimate status symbol.

Since Binion's tasteful innovation 35 years ago, every official WSOP event is adorned with a Gold Bracelet at its apex. Every champion receives one, in addition to what often amounts to life-changing prize money. In keeping with WSOP tradition, all winners of events held before 1976 were retroactively noted as "Gold Bracelet Winners." The records and accomplishments are tabulated just as if they received an actual bracelet. (Several of the 1970-1976 winners later had special gold bracelets custom made in order to join the most chic club in poker).

The universal sentiment for the Gold Bracelet was perhaps best expressed by Hollywood actress Jennifer Tilly, who was once nominated for an Academy Award. Tilly won the 2005 Ladies WSOP Championship, and was presented with her own token of victory. Afterward, she said winning her WSOP Gold Bracelet was, "better than an Oscar."

The WSOP has grown nearly every year since its inception. Now, there are more tournament events than ever, necessitated as a response to the crush of people from all over the world who now descend upon Las Vegas in an annual pilgrimage.

In 2007, the WSOP expanded to Europe, awarding the first-ever bracelets outside of Las Vegas. WSOP Europe bracelets are recognized equally alongside bracelets awarded at the (Las Vegas) WSOP and are treated and tracked in the same manner. In 2013, the WSOP Asia-Pacific awarded five gold bracelets in Melbourne, Australia for the very first time.

To date, there have been 1,102 Gold Bracelets awarded in World Series of Poker history. This figure includes every official WSOP event played, including tournaments during the early years when there were no actual gold bracelets awarded. It also includes the 37 gold bracelets awarded at WSOP Europe, plus the five from WSOP APAC in April.

In 2014, a total of 76 WSOP gold bracelets will be at stake, one more than 2013. One prize will be awarded to the 2013-14 season WSOP Circuit National Champion, the culmination of 22 events throughout the United States over 10 months and two calendar years. Ten will be awarded at WSOP APAC in October. Another 65 will be bestowed upon the individual winners of each of the distinct poker tournaments being held in Las Vegas in the summer.

The WSOP has been owned by Caesars Interactive Entertainment, Inc. (CIE), which considers the event one of the company's most powerful and attractive assets. All those who operate the WSOP acknowledge a strong personal and corporate responsibility for protecting what for many poker players is a sacred institution. The WSOP considers the growth of the game to be the most significant factor in assessing the question about adding new events and Gold Bracelets.

Poker's popularity has exploded over the past decade, thanks in large part to the advent of the hole card camera and the Internet – two factors which have helped to revolutionize the game and educate a whole new generation of poker players around the globe, adding millions of new players to the game, and who will eventually become tomorrow's new stars. As such, the WSOP attempts to effectively balance the supply and demand by ensuring the average number of entrants per event continues to increase in order to introduce new bracelets. As an example, in 2013, WSOP events averaged 1,281 entrants. In 2002, the WSOP averaged 217 entrants per bracelet awarded.

In 1976 when Doyle Brunson won the first of his back-to-back WSOP Main Event WSOP titles (world championships), he bested a field of 22 to capture the crown. At the most recent WSOP, Ryan Riess outlasted a field of 6,352 players.

The top three WSOP Gold Bracelet winners of all-time are Phil Hellmuth (13 wins), Doyle Brunson (10 wins) and Johnny Chan (10 wins). All three of these players are members of the Poker Hall of Fame. Each is still actively playing.

“Puggy” Pearson became the first WSOP player to win three Gold Bracelets at one WSOP in 1973. That incredible feat has only been equaled four times in the 44-year history of the event -- most recently by Jeffrey Lisandro at the 40<sup>th</sup> Annual WSOP, held in 2009. Ted Forrest, Phil Ivey and Phil Hellmuth are the other champions to have accomplished poker's greatest trifecta.

Just as the prestige of the WSOP has grown with bigger attendance numbers and more prize money, so too has the value of winning a WSOP Gold Bracelet. Initially, WSOP gold bracelets cost a few hundred dollars each. Now, they cost several thousand dollars. The WSOP Main Event gold bracelet, costs approximately \$500,000 – the most expensive trophy in sports!

With the passage of time and the inevitable variations of fashion and style, WSOP Gold Bracelet designs have grown increasing more elaborate over the years. Early bracelets were simple. During some years, WSOP Gold Bracelets were simply a heavy gold chain. Now, the bracelets include diamonds and other gemstones, along with 18 karat gold, white gold or yellow gold -- depending on the year and particular bracelet.

Most players keep their WSOP gold bracelets. Others gift them to close family members, particularly those have been fortunate enough to win multiples. They are considered one-of-a-kind collectibles as they indelibly serve to signify a crowning achievement in the worldwide skill game known as poker.

There are exceptions to the notion that the Gold Bracelet is a priceless keepsake. The most famous example was Peter Eastgate's decision to sell off his treasured memento, via a public auction. The 2008 WSOP Champion became the youngest winner in history with his victory at age 22. In 2010, Eastgate used the eBay online auction site and took bids for his bracelet with intent to donate the money to a charity (UNICEF). The winning bidder paid \$147,500 for Eastgate's one-of-a-kind trophy.

Actual bracelet or not, winning a WSOP title is forever regarded as a career accomplishment. Possessing the hardware is not required for immortality in poker's history books. A player goes from John Doe to “WSOP Gold Bracelet winner John Doe” the instant the final chip is stacked on poker's grandest stage. Status is measured by one thing -- the WSOP Gold Bracelet, which brings to mind a truism offered by professional poker player Phil Gordon when he professed, “In poker there are two categories of players: those with Gold Bracelets and those without.”

One must not confuse the WSOP Gold Bracelet with imitators. Imitation is indeed the sincerest form of flattery, and some other poker tournaments have begun to award their own “bracelets” to winners with hope of boosting the profiles of their events. However, such efforts have failed to convince players or the public that they are indeed noteworthy. In short, nothing compares to a bona fide WSOP Gold Bracelet.

At least one comparison is true. Although the World Series of Poker is without equal, it is indeed every poker player's Super Bowl, Olympic Games, and World Cup, with each precious victory entwined in an inimitable emblem called the Gold Bracelet.

Vanessa Selbst ended the longest female drought in WSOP tournament history when she won the 10-game Mix six-handed event at the 2012 WSOP, ended a four-year, 268-event streak. ## FAMOUS WSOP MAIN EVENT FINAL HANDS

### Ace-King

During the first 41 WSOP Main Events, never has the winning player held Ace-King as his starting hand and never has Ace-King been on the losing end of the final hand either. But, two of the past three WSOP Main Event champions have won their crown after holding Ace-King. 2013 champion Ryan Riess used Ace-King to beat Jay Farber's starting hand of Queen-Five, and 2011 champion Pius Heinz used the Ace-King starting hand to outduel Martin Staszko's 10-7 suited.

### Pocket Nines

This has been the winning hand twice in the 44-year history of the WSOP Main Event as well. It also was the losing hand once.

In 1989, Phil Hellmuth became the then-youngest Main Event champion when he rode his two black pocket nines to victory over Johnny Chan and his Ace-Seven. Chan was the two-time defending Main Event champion, but Hellmuth made WSOP history at age 24 with this famous hand.

In 2009, Joe Cada dethroned Peter Eastgate to become the youngest-ever Main Event Champion at age 21. Cada earned \$8.547 million for the victory and made the most remarkable comeback in final table history. After having just 2 million of the 195 million chips in play at one point, Cada took them all, completing his run to the record books with this historic hand.

### Ten-Two

The cards made famous by "Texas Dolly" Doyle Brunson, who won his back-to-back WSOP Main Event Championships in 1976 and 1977 holding these identical hole cards on his final hand. In 1976, he bested Jesse Alto's Ace-Jack to capture his first WSOP Main Event bracelet, and the next year Gary "Bones" Berland's 8-5 fell victim to the 10-2 Brunson held in winning his second consecutive WSOP Main Event.

### Pair of Queens

In a dramatic conclusion to the 1978 WSOP Main Event, Bobby Baldwin captured the title when his pocket queens bested Crandall Addington's pocket nines. These future Poker Hall of Famers both flopped a set on the hand, but it was the Queens of Baldwin that maintained the lead to give him his first WSOP Main Event and his third WSOP bracelet.

### Five-Four

After carrying out a bluff in the late stages of the 2003 WSOP Main Event, the aptly-named Chris Moneymaker completed his remarkable run on this memorable hand. With 5-4 off-suit, Moneymaker and runner-up Sam Farha saw a flop of J-5-4, with Farha holding J-10. Moneymaker was ahead with two pair against Farha's top pair after the flop, then all of the chips went in the middle. With a river 5, Moneymaker improved to a full house and won history's most memorable WSOP Main Event title.

### Ace-Nine

Chris "Jesus" Ferguson won the 2000 WSOP Main Event when he bested T.J. Cloutier. Ferguson had a 10 to 1 chip advantage when heads-up play began, and after a see-saw battle, Ferguson called Cloutier's all-in. Cloutier had Ace-Queen. Ferguson looked in trouble holding Ace-Nine, but a miraculous nine on the river gave Ferguson a pair of nines, and the 2000 WSOP Main Event victory.

### Ace-Four

Stu Ungar won his third and final WSOP Main Event in 1997 after his Ace-Four beat John Strzemp's Ace-Eight, when a river deuce gave Ungar the wheel straight and the victory, but the remarkable thing about Ungar's feat was the fact he almost didn't get in the tournament to begin with. After spending 24 hours trying to raise enough money for the buy-in, Ungar was the last person who bought into the event, just before registration closed. He went on to complete the Main Event trifecta, winning his final Main Event title 16 years after he last accomplished the feat for a record-tying third World Championship title.

### Jack-Nine

This famous hand was immortalized in the movie *Rounders*, in which Johnny Chan had a cameo and Erik Seidel became infamous. Chan won his second of back-to-back WSOP Main Events in 1988, and he would have become the only player to do it three times in a row if it wasn't for a kid named Hellmuth. Chan's Jack-Nine of Clubs bested Seidel's Queen-Seven in the 1988 WSOP Main Event. The flop came Q-8-10, with Chan flopping a straight and Seidel grabbing top pair. Chan raised, Seidel re-raised and Chan called. After a harmless 2 on the turn, both players checked. With a 6 on the river, Seidel shoved all-in, and Chan quickly called after successfully trapping Seidel.

### Cracked Aces

The best starting hand – pocket Aces – has only been involved in two WSOP Main Event final hands in history. And both times, the Aces were cracked! In the 1979 Main Event, Hal Fowler's seven-six off-suit cracked the Pocket Aces of Bobby Hoff when he hit a gut shot straight. Fowler is considered the first amateur to ever win the WSOP Main Event.

In 2001, Hall-of-Famer Dewey Tomko suffered the same fate in the final hand of the Main Event when Juan Carlos Mortensen's King-Queen of clubs bested Tomko's pocket rockets, rivering a King-high straight. For Tomko, it was the second time he had finished runner-up in the Main Event, joining T.J. Cloutier, Crandall Addington and Puggy Pearson as the only players to accomplish that feat.

### Pocket Kings

The second best starting hand in Texas Hold'em has never been achieved in the final hand in the 43-year history of the World Series of Poker Main Event. No player has either won or lost the Main Event holding pocket kings. In fact, only four times in WSOP Main Event history has a player holding even one king went on to win the Main Event! (1972, 1994, 2001 and in 2012. In 2012, Greg Merson's King-Five of diamonds bested Jesse Sylvia's Queen-Jack of spades).

### Give Me a Nine, Any Nine

There have been 44 WSOP Main Events in history, and remarkably, the winner in 22.7% of them (10) has held a nine in his final hand – the second most common starting card of them all for WSOP Main Event winners. (A player was holding an ace in 25% of the winning hands (11), including Ryan Riess in the 2013 Main Event.
